AIMS

The aims of this booklet are:

- To inform students and their parents of <u>procedures and rules</u> regarding Year 11 at <u>Cabramatta High School</u>;
- To inform students and their parents of the <u>New South Wales</u> <u>Education Standards Authority</u> (NESA) requirements and rules relating to the award of the Higher School Certificate;
- To inform students and their parents of <u>Assessment policies</u> and rules at <u>Cabramatta High School</u>.

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A. SOME ADVICE TO SENIOR STUDENTS

The senior years present exciting opportunities. In the senior secondary period of your education you will have greater freedom, but also greater demands will be made upon your time. Dedication to study, educational performance and achieving your personal best should be the aim of every student. Parents can be assured of the teaching staff's full support in assisting students to achieve their potential.

Success in your chosen courses can only be achieved through application, dedication and commitment to course requirements. To meet this challenge you should ensure that you regularly attend, and are punctual, to every class. Failure to maintain satisfactory attendance will be brought to the attention of your parents / guardian. It is a NESA (NSW Education Standards Authority) requirement that you attend class regularly and complete all course requirements. Should parents / guardian be interested in your patterns of attendance they can contact Ms Marasinghe by phone and be given details of absences and partial absences. A permanent computer-based record is kept of daily and period attendance and lateness to class.

A student will be considered to have satisfactorily completed a course <u>only</u> if there is sufficient evidence that the student has -

- applied himself or herself with diligence and sustained effort to the set tasks and experiences provided in the course by the school:
- achieved some or all of the course outcomes;
- attended regularly and punctually.

Due to the operation of variable timetabling for senior students, in 2021 you will commence <u>school at</u> **8.25am** each day.

Wearing of school uniform is compulsory. Students in senior years must be dressed in accordance with the Cabramatta High School uniform requirements. The wearing of uniform by all students will be strictly enforced and those choosing not to comply with these mandatory requirements will be subject to disciplinary action. Students must have full uniform for every day of school. This means having sufficient changes of clothing - "in the wash" is not an acceptable excuse.

It is important that subjects are carefully selected. However, if you are considering a change you <u>must</u> see the Head Teacher Secondary Studies, Mr Lal, in A Block. Changes <u>cannot</u> be made otherwise.

We are sure that Cabramatta High will provide you with all the educational opportunities necessary for you to obtain good results in the Higher School Certificate. Our students are our main concern and we hope there will be a successful association between parents, staff and students in your final school years.

B. ATTENDANCE PROCEDURES

1. ATTENDANCE

- If you are late to School you must report to the Administration Block (Block 8) to register your attendance. Do not attend classes without signing in or you will be marked absent for that particular day. **DO NOT GO STRAIGHT TO CLASS**
- Punctuality is important and any lateness is recorded on your attendance record.
- It is your responsibility to attend every lesson. If you do not, partial truancy will be recorded on your attendance record.
- When you are absent you must obtain an <u>Application for Leave</u> form from the Office. It is your responsibility to complete and return the form (within 2 days of the absence) to Ms Marasinghe, Ms Ward or Mrs Lee in the Administration block (Block 8).
- All absences (and explanations) are recorded and the information is supplied to Centrelink, upon request.
- Medical certificates may be required if you are sick, or if you are absent for 3 or more consecutive days.
- Your attendance will also be checked each half term and:
 - a) a computer printout of your attendance will be attached to your report;
 - b) your attendance and punctuality will be commented on in your report;
 - c) you may not gain a Higher School Certificate if your attendance is unsatisfactory;

Cabramatta High School considers a minimum attendance of 85% of all lessons / learning opportunities in each of your courses as necessary to achieve course outcomes. Should your attendance be causing concern you will be given at least two (2) written warnings prior to being declared "unsatisfactory" in a course.

d) you will also receive a certificate of perfect attendance for each semester that you do not record an absence. This is a valuable asset when seeking employment.

2. LEAVING EARLY

There are occasions when you will be allowed to leave early without any absence recorded against your name.

i) <u>Completion of Timetabled Periods</u>:

As a senior student you have different finishing times during a fortnight which must be followed. Once you have left the school grounds you are not permitted to return without first reporting to a Deputy Principal.

Students are not permitted to leave the school grounds before their final period i.e. to go shopping, obtain food etc. You are required to be on-site, and in the library, during non-teaching periods.

ii) Absent Teacher:

Senior students are also allowed to go home if their teacher is absent **for their final timetabled lesson for the day** and no class cover has been arranged. You must, however, first check with a Deputy Principal.

If you require permission to leave school early then an early leave pass can be obtained from the Deputy Principal's office before period 0. (You will need a note from your parents or guardian). The pass is also useful to show to parents, bus drivers, police and the like who may question your right to be out of school during school hours.

Please explain these procedures to your parents or guardian. These procedures only operate on the understanding that all students observe them. The privileges accorded a senior student will be withdrawn if students behave irresponsibly and the behaviour will be recorded on the student's school record.

C. USE OF THE LIBRARY AT CABRAMATTA HIGH SCHOOL

Senior students are required to attend the library whenever they do not have a timetabled class with a teacher.

STUDENT RESPONSIBILITIES

The library is available for senior students to pursue their studies. Use of library resources is a privilege for students and, in return, students are obliged to:

- (i) act responsibly;
- (ii) take care of equipment, furniture and resources, and use them well;
- (iii) study and not treat the library as a social gathering place;
- (iv) consider others studying in the library, and not disrupt them with chatter and noise.

You must follow the general rules for the library or your access to the library may be restricted for an extended period.

1. GENERAL RULES FOR USE OF THE LIBRARY

- Sign into and out of the library using to SENTRAL KIOSK
- Movement must be kept to a minimum.
- <u>No eating, drinking or chewing gum</u> is allowed in the library. No food or drinks are to be brought into the library.
- Any litter must be placed in a rubbish bin.
- Books may be borrowed in the <u>last ten minutes of a period</u> if you can't do it before school, at recess or lunch time.
- You should have your <u>ID card</u> with you in the library and produce it on request.
- Follow any instructions for the use of the <u>computers and the internet</u>. You will be held responsible for any misuse. Report any faults as soon as you find them to library staff.

D. CABRAMATTA HIGH SCHOOL CONTRIBUTIONS FOR YEAR 11 COURSES

Explanation of Contributions

- General Service: An amount set each year by the Finance Committee of the School and approved by the School Council to meet running expenses.
- Textbook: For the use of textbooks. It is not refundable.
- <u>Course</u>: This is required for some courses where the demands on the school's financial resources are greater and are specific to each student. Such courses are chosen on the understanding that a contribution is required.

E. DRESS CODE AT CABRAMATTA HIGH SCHOOL

GIRLS - SUMMER AND WINTER

- *Senior girls tunic or
- *Light grey straight or pleated skirt, grey slacks or shorts;
- *Sky blue school shirt;
- *Maroon school jacket and/or maroon school jumper;
- *Black leather shoes, low heel, enclosed. White socks or pantihose.

P.E./SPORT

- *Cabramatta P.E. shirt;
- *Maroon sports skirt or shorts;
- *White socks and sports shoes;
- *Maroon tracksuit.

BOYS - SUMMER AND WINTER

- *Mid grey school trousers or shorts;
- *Sky blue school shirt;
- *Maroon school jacket and/or maroon school jumper;
- *Black leather shoe, enclosed, white or grey socks

P.E./SPORT

- *Cabramatta P.E. shirt;
- *Cabramatta sports shorts;
- *White socks and sport shoes;
- *Maroon tracksuit.

For Year 12, it is acceptable to wear the Year 12 jacket.

NOTE:

- Skirts & shorts must be of an appropriate length.
- Students must be neat and tidy at all times.
- Jewellery is to be kept to a minimum.
- School uniform is to be worn during examinations and excursions.

F. THE USE OF MOTOR VEHICLES FOR TRAVEL TO AND FROM SCHOOL

These are the procedures that must be followed by all students using a motor vehicle to travel to and from school. They are meant to ensure the safety of student drivers, and of other students. Students who depart from these procedures will be asked to show good reason why they should be allowed to continue at the school.

- 1. These rules apply to Years 11 and 12 students only. Students in other years must not use private vehicles, driven by a student, for school travel without written permission from a Deputy Principal.
- 2. Vehicles (other than motor cycles) are NOT to be parked in the school grounds. They must be parked in the street, as provided by law. Motor cycles may be parked in the school grounds. Dangerous riding will result in withdrawal of parking privileges.
- 3. It is emphasised that on arrival at school you must remain till the end of your classes. Vehicles are out of bounds during the school day without permission from a Deputy Principal.

G. INFORMATION RELATING TO THE YEAR 11 COURSE

N.S.W. EDUCATION STANDARDS AUTHORITY (NESA) REQUIREMENTS AND RULES RELATING TO THE COMPLETION OF THE YEAR 11 COURSE

To qualify for the Higher School Certificate in 2022 students must satisfactorily complete a Preliminary pattern of study at least 12 units and an HSC pattern of study comprising at least 10 units. Both patterns must include:

- at least six units from Board Developed courses;
- at least two units of a Board Developed course in English;
- at least three courses of two units value or greater (either Board Developed or Board Endorsed courses);
- at least four subjects.

To satisfy the pattern of study requirements for the Higher School Certificate, a student may count a maximum of six Preliminary units and six HSC units from courses in science.

Students must also complete HSC Minimum Standards in reading, writing and numeracy online examinations to qualify for a Higher School Certificate (HSC).

RECORD OF SCHOOL ACHIEVEMENT (ROSA)

Students who leave school before completing the Preliminary course will receive a Record of School Achievement (ROSA) from NESA with the grades achieved for courses studied in Year 10. The ROSA will include the results of any VET or Life Skills courses studied in Year 10 and/or Year 11.

H. VOCATIONAL EDUCATION AND TRAINING (VET) COURSES

Vocational Education and Training (VET) courses are offered as part of the Higher School Certificate (HSC) or Record of School Achievement (RoSA). VET courses are designed to deliver workplace-specific skills and knowledge and cover a wide range of careers and industries. VET courses for secondary students are developed by the NSW Education Standards Authority (NESA) and are based on national training packages.

VET courses allow students to gain both HSC or RoSA qualifications and a qualification recognised throughout Australian as part of the Australian Qualification Framework (AQF). These qualifications are widely recognised by industry, employers and tertiary training providers e.g. TAFENSW and Universities and will assist students to move easily between various education and training sectors and employment.

Public Schools NSW, Ultimo operates as a Registered Training Organisation (RTO) to deliver and assess VET qualifications to secondary students.

It is mandatory for all students studying a VET course to create a Unique Student Identifier (USI). Students will require a form of identification, such as a Medicare Card, Birth Certificate, Driver's License or a valid passport for the creation of the USI.

Board Developed VET courses are classified as Category B subjects and ONLY ONE may contribute to the calculation of the Australian Tertiary Admission Rank (ATAR). These courses have an optional HSC examination. Students wishing to include a VET course in the ATAR calculation must sit the HSC examination.

Board Developed VET courses have specified workplace requirements and include industry specific mandatory work placement (35 hours per 120 hours of delivery) or occasionally simulated workplace hours at school.

Board Endorsed VET courses do count towards the HSC or RoSA but do not have HSC examinations therefore do not count in the calculation of the ATAR. Board Endorsed VET Courses have either mandatory or recommended industry specific work placement.

Assessment in all VET courses is competency based. The student is assessed on what they can do (the skills) and what they know (the knowledge) that will equip them in the workplace. Students who have successfully achieved competency will have the skills and knowledge they need to complete workplace activities in a range of different situations and environments, to an industry standard of performance that is expected in the workplace.

Competency-based training is based on performance standards that have been set by industry. Competency-based assessment materials are designed to determine if each learner has achieved all the outcomes (skills and knowledge). Students will receive documentation showing the competencies achieved for the VET course undertaken.

If the student has already completed part of the course elsewhere, or have previous life or work experience in the relevant industry, he or she may be eligible for Recognition of Prior Learning (RPL) for part of the course, or for 35 Hours work placement in the HSC course. The student does not have to repeat the training or assessment but must produce evidence of competence (which may be demonstrated during a skills and knowledge assessment). The VET committee consisting of the VET teacher, VET Coordinator and a member of the senior executive will determine if the student is eligible.

If a student has completed a unit of competency with another RTO and the student can supply evidence of the same or an equivalent competency, credit transfer is awarded (common examples include a white card course, first aid certificate or a barista course).

Due to the specific requirements of a VET course it is recommended students speak to the VET Coordinator or Careers Adviser before choosing the course to ensure they are fully aware of the requirements.

I. CABRAMATTA HIGH SCHOOL POLICY ON ASSESSMENT TASKS

I. SUBMISSION OF TASKS

- Students will be informed whether a particular piece of work is an **assessment task**, and the date on which it is due or is to be performed will be clearly notified. Adequate notice, the length of which may vary from subject to subject and task to task, will always be given for assessment tasks.
- When tasks are due to be submitted or performed the following conditions apply.
 - The Assessment Task must be handed personally to the class teacher (or Head Teacher if class teacher is absent).
 - Assessment tasks cannot be delivered by friends, handed in to "other people", or sent by other means.
 - Students must be officially present all day and attend all timetabled classes when handing in an Assessment Task - coming to school merely to hand in an Assessment Task is unacceptable.
 - o In the case of **in-class tasks**, such as tests and practical tasks, the student must also be present all day teachers will check the absentee list to see if a student has attended all day.

Note: Officially present all day is defined as being present in all timetabled classes for the full duration of each lesson. If students do not follow the school procedures for the submission of tasks, they may be awarded zero for the task.

II. EXTENSIONS OF TIME

- No extensions of time for the submission of assessment tasks will be granted other than in exceptional circumstances. Other school activities are not sufficient justification for an extension, unless prior approval has been granted by the Head Teacher of the course.
- Any request for an extension must be obtained from the appropriate Head Teacher. If the student is absent from school, it is the responsibility of that student to contact the Head Teacher.

Guidelines for Applications for Extension

- All applications for extension must be submitted (in writing) to the Head Teacher.
- o Each application will be dealt with individually and on its own merits.
- Holiday, routine medical or dental appointments, part time work commitments and routine sporting commitments will **not** be considered as valid reasons for extensions.
- o Documentary evidence e.g. a medical certificate, may be required and if available should be attached to the application. The Head Teacher is under no obligation to accept such evidence.

III. EXEMPTIONS - MISADVENTURE

Where special circumstances occur, for instance, an unforeseen hospitalisation of a student, the class teacher, in consultation with Head Teacher, may allow the student to perform the missed task or a substitute task. The student will be advised as to the decision.

IV. LATE PRESENTATION

Students who fail to hand in an assessment task on time will be awarded zero. Students who believe they have a valid reason to have a late task accepted must see the Head Teacher who will make the final decision. If the late presentation is due to illness, then a medical certificate for the day of absence is to be submitted to the Head Teacher.

VI. CONDUCT DURING ASSESSMENT TASKS

The following points should be clearly understood and noted in relation to conduct in assessment tasks.

- During a task, a student may not have any materials other than those necessary and allowed for the task.
- During a task, a student may not speak to any person other than the teacher supervising the task, for the duration of the task.
- During a task, a student should not behave in a way likely to disturb other students or disrupt the conduct of the task
- If a serious attempt at a task is not made, a student may suffer a penalty, including an 'N' determination and official warning letter.
- Frivolous or objectionable material should not be introduced into an answer, as this may lead to a penalty.
- Answers must be entirely in English, except for language tasks, otherwise they will not be considered as being serious and will not, therefore, be accepted as valid.
- Students may only use prescribed electronic devices when completing assessment tasks.
- All mobile phones and non-prescribed electronic devices are to be switched off and placed in a student's personal bag.

VII. PROVEN DISHONESTY, CHEATING OR PLAGIARISM

If it is proven that a student has cheated in an assessment task, or committed plagiarism, a mark of zero will be awarded for that task with no opportunity to redo the task.

Parents will be contacted informing them of this serious breach of exam assessment rules.

What is plagiarism?

'Plagiarism is when you pretend that you have written or created a piece of work that someone else originated. It is cheating, it is dishonest, and it could jeopardise your HSC exam results. (NESA)

VIII. THE SCHOOL'S RESPONSIBILITIES

The school must:

- Set tasks which will be used to measure student performance in each component of a course;
- Specify the relative value of each of these tasks;
- Inform students in writing of:
 - a) the components and their weightings for each course as specified in the Course Requirements
 - b) when the various assessment tasks will take place, giving students reasonable notice;
 - c) the mark value of each task in relation to the total number of marks for the course;
 - d) details of the administrative arrangements associated with each task.
- Keep records of each student's performance on each task;
- Provide students with information on their progress.
