

PRINCIPAL'S MESSAGE

I write to you on several matters concerning the welfare of students – your sons and daughters. In any community, what is good for one group is not necessarily good for the whole community. This is also true of our school: what is good for students is not necessarily good for teachers or for the government which provides taxpayers funds for education. This is why we must compromise; courses can only be provided if there are sufficient teachers; schools can only provide the services provided for within the working conditions of teachers.

In recent years we have endeavoured to move this necessary compromise much more in the direction of favouring students:

- * I believe that greater control of our resources and better management of them has enabled us to provide more courses, new courses, more facilities in classrooms and better sporting and recreational facilities.
- * The school has endeavoured to establish ways in which parents and students can have a more powerful and active voice in the running of the school through the School Council and Student Representative Council in particular.

FOR SENIORS

* In order to provide for a more flexible study program, the school day will be lengthened in 1994, and greater


Performing Arts Festival

Students were given 10 lessons of forty minutes duration during their Term III sport lessons, at the Fairfield Leisure Centre.


They were initially graded and then taught various aspects of swimming according to their ability. These included floating, entry into the water, rescues, kicking and all the swimming strokes: freestyle, backstroke, breaststroke, and side stroke.


It was pleasing to see the effort students made, and the behaviour they displayed.

At the completion of the course, students were presented with a certificate to indicate their participation and skills achieved over the ten week program.

LIBRARY REPORT

There have been many changes in the Library; most of these changes have been occurring behind the scenes. The main emphasis has been on setting up computer systems for automated Library circulation. This has now been completed and as from the start of first term next year the Library will be running a fully automated circulation system. This means that a barcode reader will be used to loan books out and to return books, and students will need their Student Services card in order to borrow.

At the present time all new books are being entered onto the OASIS Library database in order to make these books and the information they contain easier to locate. In future, as other books in the Library collection are borrowed, they will be entered onto the database ensuring that the books most in use will be entered first.

A Learning Centre has also been established in the Library for the use of students who may use the available computer equipment for study purposes or to complete assignments. A typewriter is also available and it is hoped to have at least one cubicle set up to enable students to listen to tapes or to view videos as a further aid to learning.

A CD-ROM (Compact Disc – Read Only Memory) computer system was installed in the Library at the end of last term for the use of students and teachers. This will eventually be networked with OASIS Library enabling students and teachers to access CD-ROM's from any enquiry station or terminal in the Library. We have the RTA Road

Test and JACS (Job and Course Explorer) programs ready to be installed and are currently awaiting delivery of several CD-ROM titles to install on the computer to provide opportunities for students to use this new technology and to learn the necessary skills to access this information.



freedom given to students in attendance and in the use of school facilities; provided, as always, that such freedoms are not abused.

- The School has developed links with outside organisations, businesses and our feeder primary schools. More will be done in 1994 when we have our new auditorium which will enable us to make greater use of visiting speakers.
- A start has been made on the more comprehensive reporting on students in writing, and by having parents visit the school. Much more needs to be done by reporting in a more comprehensive fashion, interviewing students and parents where there appears to be limited progress, and by conducting courses for parents within the school.

"STUDENTS AT RISK"

The term, above, is the name of one Commonwealth Government program. I use it to identify a host of programs aimed at assisting students: programs provided by various governments, and the Department of School Education. All, I am sure, are well intended; but I have reluctantly concluded that many are misguided and misdirected. Without naming the programs let me make some observations:

- Some programs seem to "throw money" at a problem, for example do we want more teachers or more caring teachers; do we want more students to merely remain at school or students to remain to study more relevant courses and courses in which they can achieve a measure of success.
- Some programs seem to believe that changes can be made in the kinds of courses on offer, that courses can be

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offered outside the school, that part-time and other students can be catered for and that repetition of courses and the study of more advanced courses are possible without considerable change in how schools run: hours of operation, our expectations of students, and of their teachers.

* There is often a naivety that seems to expect schools to solve social problems: we only need to train more students, tell students their rights, and counsellors give students and staff "the facts." When these don't work, we become depressed instead of looking at the complexity of the problem, and involving all – including students and parents – in looking for answers.

INVOLVING STUDENTS & PARENTS

All schools have students "whose level of achievement or behaviour is adversely affected by circumstances such as family dislocation, itinerance, violence or abuse" (Students at Risk program.) I cannot offer solutions but I will make some observations that may hint at some directions.

* Schools and families, which provide for communication between members, do not generally allow problems to become too large. Parents: give your sons and daughters the time needed to discuss and tell; don't forget to show interest; praise, (and when needed,) correct, but in a setting of caring; trust, give freedom to more decisions, but monitor that freedom.

* "Drugs," "violence," and "racism," are terms given to symptoms of "Students at Risk." The problem is the student at risk. What makes students at risk? Answers are not easy, and each student carries a different group of risk factors: lack of a feeling of self-worth makes some aggressive, others join support groups that we may call "gangs;" students who have parent "support" that seems to lack understanding, and who belong to a culture that seems irrelevant, leave home and become "at risk."

- * Students who have goals and who have a measure of success tend to continue to be part of the family and school community.
- * Difficulties at home often lead to the problems that surface at school truancy, and misbehaviour in class.

PLANNING FOR FUTURE CO-OPERATION

Some of our students are "at risk," the great majority are, I believe, being well catered for. For those at risk we will need to work more closely with you; for the remainder please be aware of the risks and rest assured that we are attempting to meet the needs of our students, as outlined above. If you have any comments or advice, please ring me or a Year Adviser.

SUMMARY OF THE MINUTES OF THE MEETING OF THE 4th NOVEMBER, 1993


