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PRINCIPAL'S MESSAGE

As we approach the middle of the school year, two major tasks, (additional to the normal activities of the school), need to be completed. Firstly, reports are being prepared on all pupils' progress in their studies. These reports will be given a new format, and will be accompanied by an attendance statement. Our aim has been to make the reports simpler to understand without sacrificing detail. Years 10 and 11 have just completed exams or formal testing. Year 12 will not attempt their trial H.S.C. till early August when the syllabus has been completed in all courses.

Secondly, the school is reviewing its curriculum, and our school policies. If we are to keep pace with the changes of which you have been hearing, ("Pathways"), then we must plan. Planning includes asking pupils in Year 8 and Year 10 to select courses for 1994; it means asking our School Council to give its views on some proposals; it means new courses, new books and equipment, and possibly, staff changes.

The School Council has strongly supported school policy on the wearing of uniform; at its next meeting (10th June) it has indicated that it would like to discuss such issues as "Health and Pupil Safety", and the school procedures on checking pupil attendance. The Student Representative Council is undertaking the purchase of student lockers. New Student facilities are being added to our library: "Copycard" to make photocopying easier, new computer equipment, and study booths for senior students.

These are some of the concerns in a very busy school. Your support has been important to students and staff since it is basic to maintaining a happy, safe and productive school environment.

P.S. Congratulations to Mr Vitorovich for being awarded a "Glad Way" for his excellent work in Human Society!


NEW ALEMBER OF STAFF

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CABRALINKS

The CabraLinks programme is part of the Staying-On Initiative continuing from last year. In CabraLinks, an effort is being made to help the transition of students from primary school to high school, and it is a joint initiative of Cabramatta High School and the two main feeder primary schools: Cabramatta Primary School, and Cabramatta West Primary School.

The students from the primary schools are taking part in a number of initiatives in faculty areas, and across-faculty areas. The different areas this year are: Languages, Peer Support, Visual Arts, Sport, Performing Arts, Science, Student Leadership, and Mathematics.

In many of these areas, peer tutoring is occurring, with high school students tutoring primary school students, while most of the areas are incorporating activities for Gifted and Talented students.

Once again, funding has been obtained from the Staying-On Programme to allow these initiatives to take place, and at the time of writing, the whole programme is operating.

It is gratifying to see the response from students and teachers across the three schools for this programme, and all are to be congratulated on their efforts.

INTENSIVE ENGLISH CENTRE

There are over one hundred students in the Intensive English Centre at Cabramatta High School. These students come from many different countries, and learn English as well as other school subjects in the I.E.C. before entering high school. The students sometimes stay as long as twelve months in the I.E.C. to improve their English. A lot of students come to Australia with many special talents and skills. The following excerpts have been taken from students' work in their English classes. Some of these students have been in Australia for less than 6 months. Most of them will move on to classes in Cabramatta High School in Term III.


Le Hoang HAI (Class 8)


STUDENT REPRESENTATIVE COUNCIL


CabraLinks was a great success.

Without doubt, the highlight of the day was the "buttered snails". Quite a few daring students tried them, as did Mr Kenny, our Languages Head Teacher.


EXCURSION TO HEAR THE AUSTRALIAN CHAMBER ORCHESTRA



This represents a special opportunity for our students, especially as the ACO is one of the nations' top ensembles, and it is of world class repute.






MUSICA VIVA PRESENT: "NAKISA"
