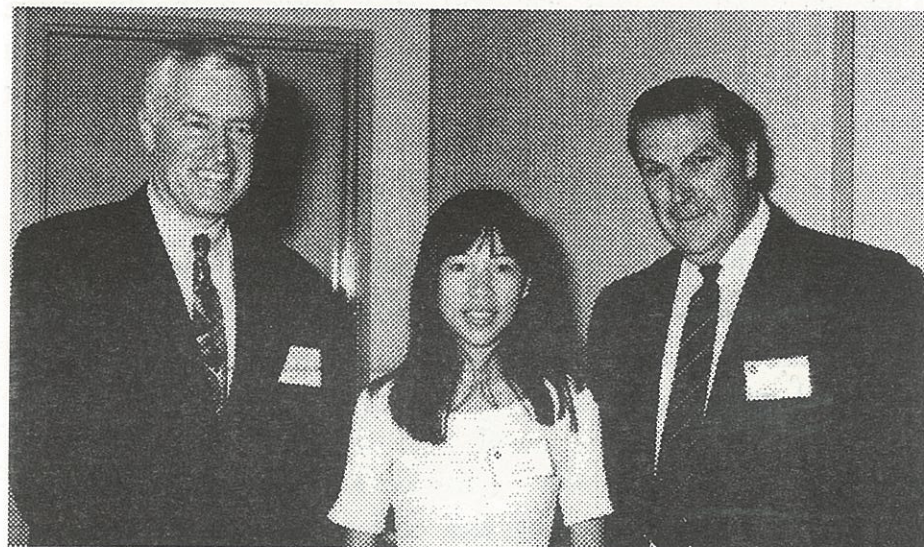
PRINCIPAL'S MESSAGE

My first few weeks as Principal of the School have been busy, but most enjoyable and I wish to thank all those who have made me feel so welcome. Mr Loader's retirement was unexpected and I know that you would all like to join me in wishing him a long and happy retirement. He gave much of himself to the School and its students and was a person who was able to look into, and plan for, the future with the interests of students in mind. Mr Loader served as Principal for the last eight years and was Deputy Principal between 1981 and 1983. I hope to be able to build on much of the work that he started.

In "CabraMatters" last edition for 1993, Mr Loader spoke of "Students at Risk" and wrote at length about the range of courses available, the increasing flexibility of the School timetable for senior students and the way the HSC can be completed in different ways. While the School is providing these opportunities, it is essential also that students accept their responsibilities. These include attendance (both at school and individual lessons,) punctuality, and working to the best of their ability. I will not recommend the awarding of School or Higher School Certificates to students who do not satisfy these basic requirements; nor will Year 11 students be promoted to Year 12 unless they also can demonstrate personal commitment to their work.

Our School's 1993 HSC results were pleasing, especially the significant improvement in the overall TER average. Two of

our students – **Ying Jun YU** (TER 99.55), and **Thi Tuong Van NGO** (Ter 98.6) were placed among the top 1,000 students in the state.

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This year we welcome the following teachers to our staff: Dr Jostsons as Head Teacher (English), Ms Lawrence in PD/Health/PE, Ms Li in ESL/Languages, Mr Beuzeville as Teacher/Librarian, Ms Sav and Ms Celkys in the Intensive English Centre, and Mr Yigit who is replacing Mr Munro as School Counsellor while he is on leave. I trust that their time at Cabramatta High School will be rewarding.

I wish also to extend a warm welcome to our new students, particularly those in Year 7, and hope that you will enjoy your stay with us. Whatever you can contribute to the School will be ultimately of benefit to you.

The School's appearance has been improved greatly by the external painting and we are soon to have the interior upgraded, including renewed facilities in Home Economics and Industrial Arts (later in the year.) The Lecture Theatre should be in operation by the end of this term. This will mean that our School has excellent facilities and it is up to all of us to ensure that they remain in good condition for a long time. Vandalism will not be tolerated and students caught damaging property will be asked to justify their remaining at this school. Student behaviour is also most important, and unacceptable behaviour will result in suspension of students. Neither students nor staff are to be put at risk by others and students must learn to accept the consequences of their behaviour.

The year has started well in terms of uniform and I am pleased to see that many students are now aware of the way in which it is to be worn. My thanks to the many families who have supported the School in this way as this is an important part of our image.

SUMMARY OF THE MINUTES OF THE MEETING OF THE 2nd DECEMBER, 1993

- ✦ Mrs Coombes and Mr Robertson re-elected as staff Representatives.
- ✦ New student member is Shuang Cai.
- ✦ Results of parent elections not known.
- ✦ Mr Loader spoke of the School Report: School as a whole; Students; Curriculum; Staff; Community; Financial.
- ✦ School to be audited during Term I 1994.
- ✦ Comments from the School Report reflected that changes in education have not always been to the advantage of the classroom itself.
- ✦ Timetable changes for 1994 require Years 11 and 12 to commence at 8.30 am to allow courses to run and TAFE attendance. Some senior students will leave school early on some days.
- ✦ Concern expressed that some students have run away from home due possibly to cultural schisms or parents concentrating on business.
- ✦ Two new awards for Presentation Day: School Council Award to a student from the SRC; School Council Award for Sportsperson of the Year.
- ✦ Mooted that the proper authorities be asked to provide a fence along part of Cabramatta Road to prevent possible fatalities.
- ✦ Meeting dates for 1994 proposed.

SUMMARY OF THE MINUTES OF THE MEETING OF THE 10th OF MARCH, 1994

- ✦ Letter of election of Parent members not received.
- ✦ Follow-up of road safety issue: unsafe crossing of Cabramatta Road; Police representatives to speak to students; congestion of Aladore Avenue; general warning to students. Traffic police to be invited to the school.
- ✦ Mr MacKenzie introduced himself and clarified his expectations of students.
- ✦ Cabramatta High School is part of Wakeley Cluster – the Director is Helen Jones. 18 schools comprise the cluster.
- ✦ The school will be subject to a full audit.
- ✦ Top HSC results of the school announced.
- ✦ Students will not continue to HSC if not serious. Students with bad attendance have been directed elsewhere.
- ✦ Budget: SC to have input into the spending of money. The budget was explained, including retained earnings, expected expenditure, global budget, rental of facilities.
- ✦ Copyright of computer software to be protected – individual liability for offenders.
- ✦ School image and marketing discussed, including grounds, uniform, internal spaces. Weekend taskforce proposed. Fences around grounds to be repaired.
- ✦ SC Discussed pedestrian through-traffic.
- ✦ CLO position will promote the school in the community.
- ✦ DSC grant of \$2,000 available on application – suggested use in the Parent English Program.

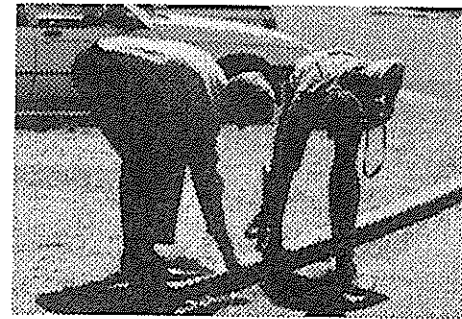
Clean Up Cabramatta Campaign

Cabramatta High School had their Clean Up Day on Friday 4th March. Years 7 and 8 took

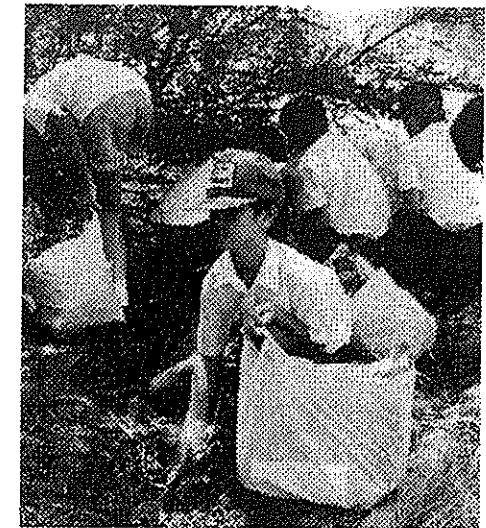
part in this exciting event. Each class had a different part of the school to work on and job to do. My class' part was gardening. Even though it was



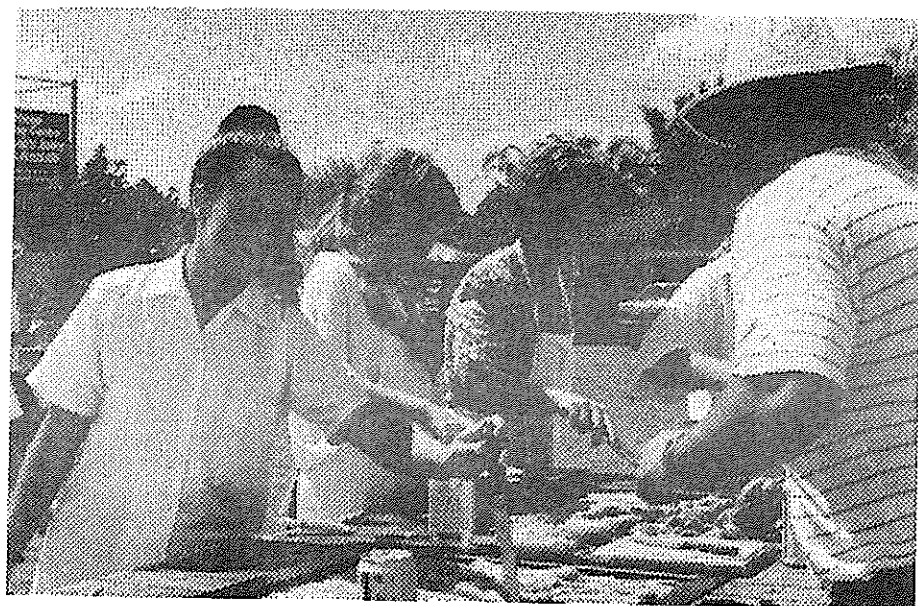
pretty messy, I actually enjoyed it. Not only did I enjoy it, but many others did. I know the boys enjoyed doing

At this stage, it is pleasing to see the enthusiasm of the teachers involved and it is to be hoped that the students at whom the programme is targetted will respond in a similar fashion.

Go Science!

As usual, the Science Staff is providing a varied programme for students this year, hoping that the very good results from last year's HSC can be further improved. Early in the year, excursions for the Year 12 Biology and Science for Life students to Mt.Kiera and Port Kembla, and for Year 12 Physics students to the Lucas Heights nuclear facility will be held; later, Year 7 students will be making the annual visit to Taronga Park Zoo.

Students also have the opportunity of entering several outside competitions run by the University of NSW, and soon our senior students will be able to enter the National Chemistry Competition. This year, in addition, the Science and ESL teachers are co-operating in team teaching several classes in different years, and it is to be hoped that students and parents support these initiatives and opportunities to further progress the impact of Science in our school.

Go west
for a top
education

THE success of students from schools in Sydney's west in last year's Higher School Certificate Examination comes as no surprise to the students, nor to the teachers who work in the region.

For, contrary to stereotypical perceptions of the western and south-western suburbs as regions of deprivation and social decay, Sydney's expanding suburban belt nowadays contains some of the city's most vibrant cultural resources and community facilities.

Educational opportunity in the region — as the latest HSC results indicate — is equal to the best the city can offer.

Students from Parramatta, Marayong, Bonnyrigg, Bankstown, Cabramatta and Gungahlin scored as well as their colleagues from the eastern suburbs and the north shore.

Their success is a measure of the positive — and deliberate — development of Sydney's outer suburbs as areas in which families are guaranteed access to the same range of amenities as those which inner-city residents take for granted.

Parramatta, a city in its own right and an area of national historical significance, is home to more than 200,000 people, most of whom would choose to live nowhere else.

And it has long since shed its image as Sydney's struggling poorer relation. Vigorous live theatre companies, the range of sophisticated restaurants and nightspots, and efficient transport links have combined to make the area a powerful magnet.

Further west, the growth of population in the new suburbs around Penrith and in the lower Blue Mountains has stimulated the development of genuine communities provided with appropriate social resources.

The University of Western Sydney, established in 1989, has encouraged more youngsters in the area to aim for tertiary qualifications and most graduates have remained in the area, their skills becoming a valuable economic and social asset.

In the past, many suburbs in the west and south west were stigmatised as havens of violence and impoverishment, areas into which it was not safe to venture for those from the more affluent east.

And in the past, principally as a result of the allocation of insufficient resources for the development of essential community services, there were worrying aspects of life in Sydney's sprawling western suburbs.

But local government leaders, ethnic community organisers and other social agencies have worked hard to eradicate that stigma.

Our claims to being an egalitarian nation depend on the provision of equal educational opportunity, and in the latest HSC results, there are encouraging indications that we are meeting that challenge.
