PRINCIPAL'S MESSAGE

Term 2 is a very busy one in the life of any school, but at Cabramatta it will be especially hectic. I anticipate that both the internal repairs and painting, and the new facilities for Home Economics and Industrial Arts will all be completed by the end of term. While this has led to considerable organisational change, it has not disrupted student learning which is a tribute to both the students and staff, and I thank everyone for their co-operation. We will go into Term 3 with a smart, fresh appearance, and one which reflects far better the quality of what happens in the school.

I was pleased to see many parents attend the Year 12 Parent/Teacher evening and hope to meet many more of you at the meetings planned for the other Years. We are in the business of education together, and it is essential that parents take the opportunity to discuss the progress of their children with us.

The time is fast approaching when Year 10 students will be selecting courses for the Senior School. We offer a vast array of courses, catering both for students who are seeking entry to a university and those who wish to enter the workforce or continue their study at a college of TAFE. It is important that parents take the time to discuss this in detail with their children rather than leaving all

the decisions to them alone. It is also vital that this discussion is realistic. It is a fact that only 30% of students studying for the HSC across the state are successful in gaining university entry, and yet most students still opt for courses of study which relate to university entry, although this pattern is gradually changing in our school where more options are available than in many other schools. We have a considerable number of students studying TAFE and accredited courses as part of their HSC, and we intend to expand this pathway while maintaining more traditional course patterns for students whose career choice demands university entry. Year 10 will be attending several meetings throughout the year so that they may make informed decisions about the course to take which will be personally satisfying and challenging, as well as providing access to an appropriate carreer. I am proud to be associated with this school as I believe it provides excellent educational opportunities for students of all interests and ability levels. These opportunities are offered in an atmosphere of peace and co-operation, very unlike what we so often read in the press. The School Mission statement -"Our students are our main concern" - is

not just a set of words, but a reality.

Nhà trường cung cấp nhiều môn học, phục vụ cả hai cho các em học sinh nào muốn vào đại học và cho các em nào muốn ra làm việc hay tiếp tục việc học của các em tại trường Cao đẳng TAFE. Điều quan trong rằng các phụ huynh nên để dành thì giờ để thảo luận chi tiết vấn đề này với còn của qui vị hơn là để cho chúng hoàn toàn tự quyết định hết tất cả. Và điều cũng quan trọng rằng việc thảo luận này là thực tế. Sự thật rằng chỉ có 30% của các em học sinh học thi Tốt nghiệp Bậc Trung học trong Tiểu bang là thành công trong việc được vào đại học và hình như hầu hết các em học sinh vẫn chọn các môn học có liên hệ để vào đại học, nhưng vấn đề này ở trong trường của chúng tạ từ từ thay đổi, mà ở tại trường này các em học sinh có nhiều chọn lựa hơn những trường khác. Nhà trường có một số lượng lớn các em học sinh đang học trường TAFE và các môn học được công nhận như là một phần trong chương trình học thi lấy Bằng Tốt Nghiệp Bậc Trung Học và nhà trường dự tính mở rộng lối đi nầy trong khi vẫn duy trì các mẫu môn học cũ để cho các em học sinh nào chọn nghề nghiệp mà cần phải có học đại học. Các em học sinh Lớp 10 sẽ tham dự nhiều buổi họp trong năm, để các em có thể biết mà quyết định rõ ràng về cách chọn các môn học, mà việc nầy sẽ làm cho cá nhân các em được thỏa mãn và thịch thú cũng như cung cấp việc lựa chọn thích hợp nghề nghiệp.

Tôi rất lấy làm hãnh diện có quan hệ với trường nầy, như là tôi tin rằng trường nầy cung cấp nhiều cơ hội tốt nhất cho các em học sinh trong tất cả ý muốn và các trình độ khả năng của các em. 

CHS IEC

Cabramatta High School Intensive English Centre (IEC) was set up in 1979 to support migrant and refugee students of secondary school age in their first few months of arrival in Australia. Currently students come from Bosnia, Cambodia, Croatia, The Czech Republic, Hong Kong, Serbia, and Vietnam.

The IEC has an important social and educational function and focus. Re-settlement in a new country is not as simple as getting on a plane and arriving in Australia. There are any number of difficulties and needs —

- * Housing,
- * New Relationships,
- * Loss of familiar surroundings and friends and close family members,
- * Learning a new language and understanding a new culture,
- * Cultural expectations.

We are one of the larger faculties of the school. Currently there are nine classes and 107 students. There are 14 teachers including a Head Teacher, a counsellor, a Secretary and 6 Teachers' Aids (Ethnic) who offer L1 support in Assyrian and Arabic, Chinese, Khmer, Spanish/Portuguese, and Vietnamese. Our Teachers' Aids have a vital role in communicating with parents / care givers, and assisting students in the classroom and in general matters.


We have a number of specialist programs: Health and Dental screening and follow-up; a Welfare program run by our Migrant Counsellor for all new students; and Literacy Programs.

Students usually remain in the IEC for an average of nine months before moving on to mainstream High School or other specialist English Courses such as AMES or TAFE.

As students develop their English language skills, they study a wider range of subjects from the Key Learning Areas, such as History / Geography, Commerce, and Computer Studies. Students at all levels study English, Science, Health Studies, PE

and Sport.

Life at Cabramatta High School and especially in the IEC is an enjoyable and rewarding experience.

Opportunity for Senior Students

Students at Cabramatta High School will benefit greatly from a new "Tutorial" program, which has been introduced to senior students to supplement their studies.

This means that in addition to their regular classes, senior students now have the opportunity to revise topics and get extra help in their subjects. Students choose to attend these tutorials in their free periods or lunchtime.

Tutorials being offered are: Physics, Chemistry, Biology, Science for Life, Geography, Art, Music, Ancient and Modern History, Essay Writing and Grammar. Occasional Tutorials will be offered in Legal Studies, Business Studies, and Economics during Terms II and III.

Comments from parents included:


"I am actually understanding maths" and

Mrs V. Mastellone of the Mathematics Faculty has taken Maternity leave.


Ms Betty Duran who has been working in ESL is now working in another school.

Tomorrow he plays for Cabramatta High against neighbors Canley Vale in the final of the metropolitan south-west championships.


The winner will represent the region later this year in the NSW CHS titles.
