Chinese Visit



Cabramatta High School is dedicated to encouraging cultural awareness through international educational exchange. As a result of our China Links Program, during 30th July - 03rd August 2018 the Languages Faculty was proud to host 35 Chinese students and their four teachers from Dongguan Songshan Lake, Keyuan and Changshi Middle Schools in Guangdong Province, China.

During their one-week visit to Cabramatta High School, the Chinese students attended classes across key learning areas and closed English lessons with their buddies. The Chinese students were highly appreciative of their educational experience at Cabramatta High School. Two special assemblies were held to welcome and farewell our special guests, followed by luncheons with a variety of foods reflecting the Australian multiculturalism.

This valuable school visit has helped Dongguan Songshan Lake, Keyuan, Changshi Middle Schools and Cabramatta High School students and teachers gain an insight into each other's schooling and culture. We aim to maintain this cultural and educational exchange program at our school on a long term basis.

Computer consultant and wrote many Computer Education textbooks.

Year 11 SDD UTS Excursion

Students went to UTS to experience the newly setup "Hello World: Code and Design" exhibition inside the UTS gallery which showcased many aspects of technology in contemporary business design. This ranged from circuits and lights in books and clothing, to 3D printed dress pieces, to shopping buzzers used in conjunction with Amazon.

Students then explored the Proto Space, a lab inside the UTS main building where designers are creating 3D printed objects and using industry 3D printers to print large objects.

Students were taught to use a software program called Fusion 360 which enabled them to create 3D models which could be 3D printed. UTS will 3D print the medallion keyrings that students created and post them to the school.

rincipal's message by Ms Godwin

2018 Education Week

The theme for this year's education week is Todays Schools - Creating Tomorrows World.

When reflecting on Education in Australia we can go all the way back in Australia's history to before European settlement when teaching and learning happened in our Indigenous communities through story-telling and through the arts. The learning was rich, connected with the land and community. The elders paid an important role in the passing of the knowledge.

Education week this year marks 160 years of public education. The establishment of public education focussed on providing accessible and affordable education for all. The initial emphasis was on a basic education and functional literacy and numeracy. Students were preparing for a future of agriculture, construction and the service industries.

90 years later when my parents were at school there was a test at the end of year 6. This test decided what high school you went to. My dad went to a trade school and became a fitter and turner and my mother went to a secretarial school and became a secretary. Education was preparing them for the jobs and world of the time.

When I was a school student the emphasis was on knowledge acquisition and through the Whitlam Government there was a strong focus on tertiary education. We were being prepared for a world that required information and the ability to continue to learn after our schooling days were over.

When I was a young teacher technology became a strong focus for schools, we were starting to speak about 21st century learning. We were preparing students for a world where technology would be prevalent in the work force and life.

Now 160 year after the first public school was opened in NSW we are evolving again with concepts such as STEM, creative thinking and global citizenship. We are preparing students for jobs and a world that doesn't exist. This is exciting; it opens up many pathways and opportunities. The world will need problem solvers, critical thinking, resilience, emotional intelligence and people with ideas.

Education has changed with the years and the world, from being a focus on self, survival and immediate community to global and universal spheres. We have moved from memorizing to creating and solving. We have stepped beyond learning as children to life-long learning.

I challenge everyone to consider the following questions:

What will you be doing 10 years from now?

How are you preparing yourself for the unknown?

Are you fearful or exciting about the opportunities in front of you?

Today's Schools definitely Create Tomorrows World.


Top 20 Gifted & Talented Program










Welfare



From 1 April 2018, all school principals are required to request an immunisation certificate at enrolment.

While students can still be enrolled if an approved immunisation certificate is not provided, these children will be considered unimmunised and may be excluded from school if there is an outbreak of a vaccine preventable disease at the school OR if they come into contact with a person with a vaccine preventable disease, even if there is no outbreak at the school.

Parents are encouraged to ensure that their children are up to date with their immunisations and to provide an immunisation certificate from the Australian Immunisation Register (AIR) at enrolment, either:

- an AIR Immunisation History Statement OR
- an AIR Immunisation History Form

Why these changes have been made

These changes have been made to collect accurate information about children's immunisation status and to help manage disease outbreaks in schools and the community. Data show that there has been an increase in some vaccine preventable disease notifications in older children compared to younger children. Also, it is now easy for parents to access the immunisation records of older children on the Australian Immunisation Register (AIR) which holds immunisation records given at any age".

* Currently immunisations given in the School Vaccination Program are not sent to the AIR. Commencing in late 2018 school immunisation records will begin to be sent to the AIR. School vaccination records are not required for enrolment, however if you wish to obtain records for your child, contact your local public health unit on 1300 066 055



Why immunisation is important

Immunisation is the best way to protect your child from serious diseases. By immunising your child, you are protecting them and others in the community, especially those who are too young to be immunised or those that are not able to be immunised for medical reasons. The more people that immunise their children, the more we can control serious preventable diseases.

AIR Immunisation History Statement

The AIR records the immunisations given to children and sends parents an AIR immunisation History Statement after their child has turned 4 years of age. This can be used for enrolment.

Parents can request a copy of their child's AIR immunisation History Statement at any time (up to their child being 14 years of age):

- using their Medicare online account through myGov https://my.gov.au/
- using the Medicare Express Plus App www.humanservices.gov.au/individuals/subjects/ express-plus-mobile-apps
- calling the AIR General Enquiries Line on 1800 653 809

Children aged 14 years and over can request their own Immunisation History Statement from the AIR by using or creating their own Medicare online account through myGov https://my.gov.au/

Fully immunised children

Over 94% of children in NSW are fully immunised at 5 years of age and their AIR Immunisation History Statement will include the words "This child has received all vaccines required by 5 years of age" at the bottom of the page.

Important facts

- To enrol your child in primary or secondary school, please provide an immunisation certificate, either: an AIR Immunisation History Statement (for a child that is up to date, not up to date or can't be immunised for medical reasons or has natural immunity) OR an AIR Immunisation History Form (for a child on an approved catch-up schedule).
- If an approved immunisation certificate is not provided at enrolment, students can still be enrolled at school but they will be considered as unimmunised in the school's immunisation register.

Children with medical contraindications or natural immunity

Children who cannot be immunised for medical reasons, or who have natural immunity, will still be recorded as "Up to date" on their AIR Immunisation History Statement if an AIR Medical Exemption Form has been completed by a GP/medical specialist and sent to the AIR. The medical exemption or natural immunity will be listed near the bottom of the Statement.

Children immunised overseas

Where vaccines have been given overseas and are not recorded on the AIR, the child's overseas records should be checked by a GP/nurse who will then transfer the information to the AIR. Parents should then request an updated AIR Immunisation History Statement to give to the school.

Children not fully immunised

For children who have not had all the recommended immunisations by 4 years of age, their AIR Immunisation History Statement will list the missing immunisations and the due dates at the bottom of the page. These children should be started on an approved catch-up schedule and an AIR Immunisation History Form completed by the GP/nurse and sent to the AIR. Parents can then provide a copy of the AIR Immunisation History Form to the school at enrolment.

Please be aware that students who have not had all the recommended immunisations for their age, or where no immunisation certificate has been provided, may need to stay at home during a disease outbreak. This is to protect the child and stop the spread of disease.

- Students without an approved immunisation certificate and those who are unimmunised may be excluded from school if there is an outbreak of a vaccine preventable disease at the school OR if they come into contact with a person with a vaccine preventable disease, even if there is no outbreak at the school.
- NSW Health works closely with schools to offer the vaccines recommended for adolescents in a school-based vaccination program. In 2018, human papillomavirus (HPV) and diphtheria-tetanus-pertussis (dTpa) vaccines are being offered in Year 7 while Meningococcal ACWY vaccine is being offered in Years 10 and 11.

Night Under the Stars

My group of friends and I (Ale, Yusuf, Loc, Alexis, Nikola and Potsawat) were the only students who attended this, we saw no other students except us, but we did see many people wanting help out to spread awareness to parents and kids.

My friends and I weren't bored for most of the time since there was a park nearby and there was also basketball court behind a stage that was holding auctions and presenting raffles to raise money to help the homeless. We mostly spent our time at the park playing tip and taking photos with a camera that Nikola and Alejandro bought from home.

There were many activities and food stores that we could take part in to raise money, such as selling food, games like throwing a rugby ball into goal. We also saw kind people donating clothing, blankets and canned food for those who are struggling. IEC Exploring the Georges River

On 21 August 2018, Cabramatta IEC students from Level 2 and 3 went on a site study excursion to Chipping Norton Lake and Frères Crossing at Kentlyn. We went to the river and also for a bushwalking in the Georges River catchment – it was very impressive.

At Chipping Norton Lake we observed the beautiful view and we did some experiments to test the water quality of the lake. We did experiments testing the water for dissolved oxygen, phosphates, turbidity and PH. The water was quite clean despite the fact that there were two stormwater drain outlets.

After that we moved to our next destination, Frères Crossing. We went for a short bushwalk, through a koala zone, all the way to the river. We learnt about koala food and shelters. When we finally arrived at the river, we did more water testing. This part of Georges River was fresh water where many platypus live. Sad, but we didn't see any platypus. The water was very clean and in good condition for aqua creatures but it was so cold (13oC) that we couldn't see anything in the river. We had a lot of fun and learnt a lot about the Australian environment.

These tests told us how clean the river was. We also compared these tests at the two locations.





The Belt & Road STEM excursion

Three students from Cabramatta High and two students from Casula High travelled over 8000km to Chongqing in China to participate in The Belt and Road Science camp. It was an intensive one week program with 18 participating countries that allowed students and teachers to meet great minds from across the globe, sharing STEM knowledge and ideas. I was very proud to see the girls work long days and late nights to ensure projects and presentations were completed to the utmost quality. They participated in numerous STEM activities such as 3D printing, model building, LED light programming and they even programmed and installed a humidifier.

The students gained a wealth of STEM knowledge & skills and also had the opportunity to experience Chinese culture. They participated in a tea ceremony where they learnt about the Science and history of tea in China. Visits to the local secondary school gave them a glimpse of what Science classes were like in China with access to the most advanced technology. Visits to ancient towns and temples gave our students the opportunity to experience Chinese culture and delicious cuisines.

The trip would not have been such a success without the organization from Dr Ken Silburn, the coordinator of the LAZSTA iSTEM program and our sponsors, Mekong Mounties.

Here's what our students had to say about our trip:

From the 14th to the 20th of August, 3 year 20 students from Cabramatta High School attended The Belt and Road Teenager Science Summer Camp as representatives of Australia. The camp was in association with the China Adolescents Science Technology Innovation Contest (CASTIC). We attended the CASTIC Science exhibition where international contestants showcased their scientific projects which were inspired by critical issues currently existing in the world. They addressed the need to improve our world in areas of water quality, mining and health. Significant exhibitions included the RAM robot by Luxembourg which uses Virtual Reality to see through the eyes of the robot to perform tasks such as surgery with precision and bomb diffusion in the safety of ones home. Bioplastic made using shrimp shells done by Myanmar and using gold to detect arsenic in water by Sweden.

Attending the exhibition inspired a great deal of innovation and further interest in the field of STEM. We left the exhibitions feeling starstruck after being exposed to so many possibilities and ideas that we believe will have significant influence on the world. The exposure to such ground breaking ideas from people our own age encouraged us to endeavour on the paths of STEM and produce similar, extraordinary work.

The camp was a great place to find new friends and sharpen your social skills, as we all shared a common interest in Science. The Science Summer Camp showcased Science from all around the world and its role in school environments. Being able to explore China's boundless beauty was far beyond breathtaking as their history ran through the cities of Chongqing. The Belt and Road Teenager Science Summer Camp has offered to us students a first hand experience of what STEM has to offer to through various programing and coding systems.

The first course was Interactive arts, where students created a programming computer chip called a 'Mirco Bit'. Teams had to work together to produce a functional mainstay that can process interactive effects. Students who chose science in life studied the complications experienced by us on a regular basis and got the chance to construct prototypes using the given materials.

The last course which was engineering and technology, taught students how to create 3D printing designs on a computer software. Students also got the chance to complete a structural framework through the given mechanical features.

During our last days together, we were asked to present a powerpoint about our trip in Chonqing, China. This activity and other courses from the program allowed us to realize that STEM is a very broad yet interesting subject that will be our future.

When applying for a position within a large organisation, it is advised by the graduates that students should do some research to gain a thorough understanding of the company.

The following activity was a role-playing exercise for a mock job interview. This familiarised the students with an interviewing environment and possible interview questions. A majority of the interview questions were based on a scenario which required the students to use the STAR (situation, task, action, result) acronym to answer these questions. The STAR acronym provides a guideline to adequately address a question based on a workplace challenge. This involves describing the situation, identifying the tasks required, determining the actions needed and outlining results.

The Commonwealth Bank graduates explained the significance of life-long learning and self-improvement. From this program, the students are more familiar with structuring a resume and are better prepared for future job interviews.

Through this program, I have personally gained more knowledge and confidence for my future job interviews. I would definitely recommend the continuation of this program for future year nine and ten groups. This would help them gain crucial skills before entering the workforce. Overall, it was a very successful day and I definitely enjoyed my time with the Commonwealth Bank graduates.




