It has been another great term of teaching and learning at Cabramatta High School.

We began the year with news of our HSC student results for 2021. Our HSC students had complexities and challenges in 2021, and an extended period of learning from home. The HSC results were amazing and truly reflect the dedication, perseverance and ability of our students and staff. The dux of the school, **Hieu Nghia Vuong,** achieved an ATAR of **99.15** and was placed on the NSW All Rounders list. As a cohort, our Year 12 students more than doubled the number of top band results across all HSC subjects. **Teona Petreska** achieved first place in NSW in Macedonian Continuers and **Lisa David** achieved first place in Khmer Continuers. **Mai Phuong Nghi Nguyen** achieved second place in NSW in Vietnamese Continuers. It was very impressive to see all the wonderful achievements of our HSC students.

Early in the Term 1 Cabramatta High School was announced as an **Ambassador School,** one of only ten schools in NSW. Ambassador Schools are recognised as high-performing schools, particularly in the areas of reading, numeracy, attendance and HSC performance. University research teams will be conducting research to find out what the effective practices in Ambassador Schools are, and how they can be shared with other schools. We look forward to participating in the Ambassador Schools program. A special video about our school was made late last year for the Ambassador Schools program. Check it out on our school website.

There has continued to be an impact of COVID-19 in schools across the state. While we have had cases in the school, thanks to the dedication of staff who have been voluntarily taking additional classes, we have been able to continue to cover all lessons. When there are cases in our school community, this is communicated via social media.

This term we also celebrated **Harmony Day** as a school. There was a special assembly with a student performance and speeches. At lunch we had an international food festival, showcasing cuisine from around the world. Many students and staff prepared and cooked food for the food festival, and there was a Lion Dance performance. It was a wonderful celebration of the diversity, harmony and multiculturalism at our school.

In sport, there have been many students and teams which have excelled. **David Leauma** of Yr12 has been selected in the NSW Boys Volleyball team. In the NSW Volleyball School Cup our boys team placed first in the state, and our girls team placed third in the state. **David Leauma, Edward Tran, Jason Thai** and **Talitha Raitekiteki** represented Sydney South-West in Volleyball, with the girls team ranking 3rd and boys ranking 4th in the state. In the Benera Zone representative teams, we have 37 students who have been selected at zone level. In March our house captains participated in an AFL Harmony Day, and celebrated their cultural stories.

Enjoy this edition of Cabramatters. I wish all our students and their families a happy and safe holiday, and look forward to Term 2!



The Port Macquarie Koala Hospital operates emergency koala rescue 24 hours a day, 7 days a week. How do we do this?

Amazingly, all our rescuers and the people that answer the emergency phone line are volunteers. We are lucky to have dedicated people who understand the importance of rescuing sick or injured koalas whenever possible, and who want to make a personal contribution to the conservation of the species.

'I believe this work is crucial, we literally need to save every koala we can.' (Rescuer, Dale Cooper)



The commitment is significant - training in rescue protocols, operating the overnight phone line, being ready and available to drop everything and head out rain or shine, day or night to assess koalas and if necessary bring them into care, also dealing with the trauma rescuers experience during some rescues. Calls to the emergency line usually come in from members of the public who have seen a koala with signs of disease or trauma (most commonly car accident or dog attack). Koalas can be found in dangerous or unsuitable locations. These koalas are sometimes brought in to the Hospital for a health check, or in some circumstances may be quickly relocated to a safe area nearby.

It's not easy to rescue a koala but the rewards are huge. After a rescue, I follow their progress through rehabilitation. And their obvious joy when they go back to the wild, it's priceless. (Rescuer, Carol Dalton)

Hijack your readers mind with the power of language

Have your English teachers ever told you to be more descriptive? Have they insisted you add more detail? Maybe, appeal to your senses, or add that extra bit of 'zhuzh' in your creative writing?




What your teacher is talking about is 'sensory imagery.' Sensory imagery is necessary for enabling readers to imagine and visualise what is going on in your narrative. A lot of the time, this is what you are missing in your writing! Suppose you think about reading as an act of essentially looking at a bunch of scribbles on a page that allows you to conjure images in your mind. In that case, it


becomes clear how important it is to empower those scribbles – better referred to as written language – with the magic of imagery so that your readers' imaginations will be fired up. Your readers should experience vivid and visceral scenes in your imaginative writing! Since reading is often for entertainment: to 'travel' to distant lands or strange planets; to feel excitement, thrill, or horror; to be enlightened; to be so absorbed into something that you forget about everything around you; it is imperative that you capture your readers into your stories so that you can successfully achieve those aforementioned purposes. Without imagery, your 'creative' writing falls flat, disappearing into the ether of boring exposition.

Recall the numerous times when you fade in and out of focus and attention when you are caught up in small talk about the weather or the long journey someone undertook home after school during the sweltering summer heat. The conversation usually goes something like this: "It was so hot. It took me ages to get home!" Had the speaker mentioned their smelly socks, which were oozing with the salty sweat that soaked into the material, squelching with every step they take in their leather shoes, perhaps you'd be shaken awake from your boredom. [1] Had the speaker mentioned their feet as heavy as textbooks, shoes dragging against the crumbly concrete pavement and face seared by the sun's biting rays, perhaps you would've finally met their illuminated eyes with yours. These descriptions make the listener feel as hot and sweaty, and exhausted as the speaker. We understand that the speaker's feet aren't heavy textbooks but rather that their feet were as heavy as "maths" textbooks[2] and that the sun's heat felt like they were figuratively biting at the speaker's face. These vivid and sensory descriptions are what sets apart an engaging story from a boring one – both in conversation and writing.

So, what is this magical thing they call "Show, Don't Tell"? Well, you need to show as much without telling too much. The art of showing through your writing requires the art of artistic flair and creativity. Writing beautifully without boring the readers to death with the nonchalant rant of your everyday existence seems too far-fetched. The irrelevancy of everyday talk can do an injustice to your writing you simply were born to slay. Take your readers on a journey through every fibre of their beings. Ignite their senses that



will enrich their sight, sound, taste, smell, and touch. It's simply not about a delicious burger but a soft seeded buttery bun topped with tomato, lettuce, and cheese. With every bite you take will surely fall you to your knees. You need to sell the readers with mental images to draw the audience into your imaginative world.



The strategy most often promoted in the classroom to help imbue your writing with the powers of imagery is: Show, Don't Tell – something you've heard repeatedly in your English classes. If, for some reason, this strategy doesn't ring a bell, here is a summary by MasterClass (2021): "Show, don't tell" is a writing technique that allows the reader to experience details of the story through actions, sensory details, words, or the expression of characters' emotions, as

opposed to through the author's own description of events." Metaphorically speaking[3], "show, don't tell" is like when you cook up a delicious meal for your diners to consume and experience for themselves rather than just telling them verbally that you've cooked an awesome meal, going into describing the wonderful flavours for them and not ever giving them a bite to taste. Nothing is worse than having to listen to someone describe a cake they've baked and knowing that they haven't even brought a piece for you to try. With "show, don't tell", you allow your readers to taste the meal, or rather to experience the story. Readers can step into the shoes of your characters to vividly experience their state of mind, get deeper insights into their point of view, and, in a sense, wield that very same sword.


The birds who once were chirping in the sky. Would now always face Air pollution and eventually die. It's sad but this is how the world is now at. It's time we face reality and take off the hat.

How Has Accelerated Maths Extended Or Challenged You?




Mock Mediation

ROUND 1: MOCK MEDIATION

Mediation is an alternative form of conflict resolution where respective parties express their grievances and with the guidance of 'expert' mediators reach an amicable solution to their disagreement that brought them to mediation to start with. Mediation is a widely used method of conflict resolution in civil matters where there has been a break down in a relationship.

Cabramatta High School's 2022 team is made up of the mediators, played by Jennifer Tran and Ethan Trejo Granados and Party A played by Nadia Duong and Cindy Tieu. Along with Party B played by Marrika Tous and Kevin Cao who after a few sessions of preparation were thrown into the deep end of the legal world of mediation.







You are probably wondering what is "Mock Mediation"? Let us enlighten you. Mock mediation is a competition organised by the Law Society of NSW that provides an opportunity for Year 10 students to learn about legal methods of resolution and the processes involved.

ROUND 1: MOCK MEDIATION

Round 1 presented the team with a complex yet typical scenario of a falling out between a group of high school friends where mutual trust has been broken and replaced by hard feelings and grudges. Through the use of the mediation model and guidance by Mrs. Passarelli, the team navigated the challenge before them. After two years of disruptions to the program by the pandemic and subsequent lockdowns and restrictions, it was a steep learning curve for all involved. The team displayed excellent communication skills and were commended on their teamwork and ability to convey and express their roles by the external judge. It seems we have some budding legal eagles amongst us, and it provided an opportunity for the students to receive feedback from legal professionals in the field.

The team demonstrated initiative and were able to work effectively together to achieve so much in such a short turn around. After a debrief of Round 1 results the team look forward to improving their mediation and conflict resolution techniques for Round 2. Well done team and a special mention to Tamia Ngo for her technical support through the recording of the mediation session. All the best for Round 2!




